### EVOLUTION OF THE STEP PROJECT:







- In California, the teen birth rate was reduced by 45% between 2000 and 2012. Nonetheless, the number of teen mothers in California remains significant, with nearly 35,000 children born to mothers aged 19 or under in 2012 (latest year for which data are available).
- In that year, California ranked 19th in the nation in teen birth rates, at 23.6 per 1000. 21 California counties had birth rates significantly higher than the national average.

- Teen mothers face multiple, difficult challenges in their lives. Child care, education, employment, housing, health care, nutrition, and physical/emotional safety.
- and physical/emotional safety. Many teen mothers have limited or even no support system to teach and guide them on their parenting journey as they themselves try to navigate adolescence. Most high schools have cut funding for support services for pregnant and parenting students.

- The STeP project seeks to bridge the gap, by piloting a model for library services for pregnant/parenting teen moms in selected public libraries.
- Each library will work with <u>community partners</u> to recruit participants and implement a series of informational/instructional
